Such persons are, in terms of regulation 16(5), permitted on a once - off basis, to return to their places of residence or work. The provision will permit this once-off movement during the period 1 May 2020 to 7 May 2020. It is not required of such persons to produce a permit in order to cross provincial, metropolitan or district boundaries during such once -off trip.		NONE
29/04/2020	Minister Dlamini-Zuma COGTA	G 43258	480	Disaster Management Act (57/2002): Regulations issued in Terms of Section 27 (2) of the Act	The Regulations mandates the Minister for Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs, upon the recommendation of the Minister for Health and in consultation with Cabinet, to declare the applicable alert levels, and the extent to which they apply at a national, provincial, metropolitan or district level, as follows: (a) 'Alert Level 1' as determined by Cabinet; (b) 'Alert Level 2' as determined by Cabinet; (c) 'Alert Level 3' as determined by Cabinet; (d) 'Alert Level 4' as determined by Cabinet; and (e) 'Alert Level 5' as determined by Cabinet. The Regulations mandates the Minister for Health to issue directions on the criteria that will guide the determination of alert levels. A Magistrate may make an order to compel such a person to quarantine himself or herself, or to travel to such site of isolation, quarantined facility, or to subject himself or herself to medical screening.</p> <p>The regulations further provide for the establishment of a database, systems, procedures and required content for contact tracing by the national Health department, and for the confidentiality, obtainment, interception, handling and destruction of information in the database, including that such information may only be obtained in relation to the location or movements of persons during the period 5 March 2020 to the date on which the national state of disaster has lapsed or has been terminated.</p> <p>The Regulations provide for the release of resources by organs of and institutions within national, provincial and local</p>		
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				<p>government, other than funding, for the implementation of the regulations and directions.</p> <p>The Regulations provide for the identification of temporary shelters for homeless people; and temporary sites for quarantine and self-isolation that comply with required adequate spacing standards and health guidelines & protocols, by the State during national state of disaster.</p> <p>The regulations provide for Emergency Procurement Procedures; the Resolution of Disputes involving State Parties through Alternative Dispute Resolution; and Offences and Penalties for Misrepresentation by any person, or the Intentional Exposure of another person to Covid-19;</p> <p>The Minister for Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs declares that <u>Alert Level 4</u> will be applicable from 1 May 2020 in the Republic of South Africa and will remain in force up to the declaration of different Alert Levels for the duration of the national state of disaster. This obligations also applies to self-employed persons (for example, plumbers or electricians) whose working activities bring them into contact with members of the public</p> <p>For the purposes of OHSA in the workplaces to which this directive applies, the identifiable hazard relating to COVID-19 that workers face is the transmission by an infected person to workers in the workplace. In workplaces to which the public has access, the hazard includes transmission of the virus by members of the public. Each situation requires special measures to be implemented by employers in order to prevent the transmission of the virus.</p> <p>Although OHSA requires employers to review and update the risk assessment on a regular basis, the new hazard posed by COVID-19 is clearly identifiable and the basic measures to eliminate or minimise the risk are now well known.
